


#### Apache Firestorm JS #1A354201

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#### Tales of the Track

Hello IABA members. This is the first installment of what we hope can be a monthly column on Arabian racing, depending on your questions and interest. For those of you who don't know me, I have been breeding Arabians over 30 years, became actively involved with horse racing in 1986 and have been a part-time free-lance journalist for 20 years. There is a wealth of information I can provide to you on horse racing in general and Arabian racing - including its history in the west, its brief life in Idaho, obstacles in the industry and current trends. Your questions are invited, and I will incorporate them - hopefully, with satisfactory answers - in future columns. But for this first effort, until I know where your interests lie, I will share with you a story. (Please submit questions to the newsletter editor!)

This is a true account of one of the many humorous adventures which took place during the career of BW Baryshnikov, an Arabian race horse. Baryshnikov or 'Nick', as we called him, was a great runner and a Stakes winner with a famous sire (\*SR Nadom). But he always ran in the shadow of his older brother, BW Rasputin, and perhaps that was why he had an 'attitude' and was such a 'character'. There was trial by fire, trial by water and trial by Baryshnikov.

To set the stage for this story, I must tell you how it was in those early years when Arabian racing was in its infancy. Nick won his first start at a little 'bush' track in Idaho where the track announcer mispronounced his name, calling him 'Berryskinoff'. I had to learn how to gallop my own horses because in the beginning the better gallop riders at the tracks would not ride Arabians, saying there was 'too much neck' in their faces. Not a problem for me because I already rode English, broke and trained my own horses and weighed 112 pounds. But I was almost 5'8" and always felt like a 'grasshopper' perched on that tiny saddle on the back of a galloping horse.

The Arabs could only have stalls at the bigger tracks on race days, so we would 'haul in' to exercise our horses. In fact Arabians were housed in goat stalls the first years they ran at one of the tracks in Washington. True story. When I hauled in to Les Bois Park at Boise, I would tie my horses to the side of the horse trailer. Can you imagine a Silver Charm or a Skipaway tied to the side of a horse trailer, awaiting their turn to gallop? Not in a million years! Mine were well behaved because we went out to the foothills for exercise in between track visits, and they were used to being tied to the trailer. In fact the horse trailer was their home away from home.

One Saturday I had taken Nick out to Les Bois Park for a gallop. We were in our second lap on the far turn about five lanes out, when two thoroughbreds came by on the inside breezing. Many Arabians become very easily bored, and Nick was one of these. He wanted to work briskly, not gallop boring laps, and so was looking for any excuse. He immediately jumped about three lanes out to the right, never breaking stride. I was okay and stayed with him. However, we were now close to the outside rail, and all the 'Saturday morning railbirds' were 'perched' at the outside rail. These are the owners who come out on the week-ends to watch their horses being galloped. When Nick noticed the 'railbirds' (my God, something new!), he jumped back about three lanes toward the inside of the track. That was the end for me, and off I went!

At first, I thought I had been knocked cuckoo because I couldn't focus on anything. Some 'railbirds' got me off the track and picked up the lens that had popped out of my glasses frame. Once I had the complete pair of glasses everything came back into focus just fine, and I began to look for my horse. They said, "He went that way", meaning he had left the track via the starting gate chute. Another trainer on a golf cart came by and offered to take me to find my horse.

Looking off the track, I could see my truck and trailer parked in the little grassy area between the shed rows and the race track. I had hoped Nick would head for that grass, but he was nowhere to be seen. We rode in the golf cart up and down every shed row and finally went to the main gate to warn them that there was a loose horse. My trainer friend with the golf cart said I should call the sheriff and that he would take me to a phone. But he said, "First, don't you want to go and let your other horse out of the trailer?"

I looked at him blankly - what 'other' horse? I had only brought one horse to the track that day. He had driven past the side of my trailer on his way up to the rail, where he picked me up, and could see a horse standing in the trailer. Well, guess who?! Baryshnikov, apparently knowing he was in 'deep doo doo' for dumping me on the track and running off, had nosed the unlatched trailer door open and climbed back in. There stood my 'missing horse', helping himself to a full hay bag, and he had been there for almost an hour. "Ho hum. You were worried about me?"

## Minutes of the Idaho Arabian Breeders General Membership Meeting July 24, 2004

Meeting was called to order at 7:30 pm by President Bill Heusser at the home of Pat Nations. Present were Rochelle Garza, Chris Murphy, Jon Schmeck, Rob & Cec Foster, Bob & Sheila Harmon, Bill Heusser, Clarice & Gary Miner, Bonnie Dyas, Pat Nations, Bernadette Nickol & her 3 daughters.

Since there have been no meetings for several months, and no minutes from previous meetings were available Rob Foster moved that we accept the lost minutes and Bob Harmon seconded. Motion passed.

Treasurers Report: Cec reported our current balance. Bob Harmon moved and Clarice seconded that we accept the treasurer's report. Motion passes. (Balance available to members with phone call, but not to be published.)

Futurity Report; Bob reported the Futurity Balance (Balance available to members with phone call, but not to be published.) \$800 was authorized for advertising and full page ads were run in Just Horses and Horse Sports in August. These ads listed Nominated Stallions and invited people to the Classic for the Stallion Presentation. We have 36 nominated stallions. 15 horses are eligible to show for Championship in 2004, 12 in 2005, 25 in 2006 & 34 in 2007. \$145.00 was paid to IABA. Bob made a motion and Cec seconded it for a change in policy this year - a receipt will be issued for the original nomination & the certificates will be issued in the weanling year when complete information is available. Motion passes

Bennu Report: We have completed 3 shows and they are going well. Making roughly \$300-400 per show.

Classic Report: Prizelist is being sent out by post card and website. We still need to arrange for the rodeo arena. There will be no charity for 2004. Rates for classes are being raised and there is a price break if you are a member of IABA. Sheila will be receiving the pre-entries and Pat N. will be calling for sponsorships.

New Business: There were three open positions on the Executive Committee - Vice President, Secretary & 1 board seat (seat of immediate past president). Nominations were:

VP - Sheila Harmon, Clarice Miner

Secretary - Bonnie Dyas

Board - Pat Nations, Chris Murphy, Clarice Miner

Bonnie Dyas resigned her board seat to run for Secretary so two board seats to be chosen. Results were Vice President - Sheila, Secretary - Bonnie, Board - Pat Nations & Chris Murphy.

The 800# for the club was discussed. There is a cost for listing in the yellow pages and the number is not effective. After discussion it was tabled pending more research and a more complete marketing plan.

Pat Nations offered the club a new TV/VCR combination for \$50 plus tax for the club. Sheila moved to accept the offer & Rob seconded. Motion passed.

Clarice made a motion to create a Performance Futurity and Bob seconded. Motion passed.
